WISCONSIN CIVICS EXAM GRADUATION REQUIREMENT

In accordance with Wisconsin State Act 55, all students, starting with the Class of 2017, must take a civic test comprised of 100 questions that are identical to the 100 questions that may be asked of an individual during the process of applying for U.S. citizenship by the United States Citizenship and Immigration Services. The student must correctly answer at least 65 of those questions in order to graduate from high school. Those students taking American Studies 3 with either Mrs. Stolaski or Mr. Wolf this spring will have an opportunity to take this civics exam during their scheduled class on either <u>Wednesday, May 28th or Thursday, May 29th</u>. WIAA ADJUSTED GRADING POLICY

SPRING SPORT - Quarter 3 Grade Check - April 9th

· Grades were due to the guidance office on Wednesday April 9th, so the grade check was performed that day.

• Any athletes receiving a failing grade or incomplete grade will be ineligible for <u>15 school days and nights</u> from competition (we cannot count weekends or spring break days)

• During that period of ineligibility, those said students remain part of the team, still practice, attend everything team related - they are just not permitted to compete

· On the 16th school day the athlete can regain his/her eligibility as long as he/she is passing ALL grades reported on Skyward

- per the cumulative Semester 2 mark

· Athletes may regain their eligibility status on Thursday, May 1st as long as they are passing all their classes per the cumulative mark

· If not passing by the 16th school day, then the ineligibility period is extended day-to-day until the athlete is passing all classes per the cumulative mark

FALL SPORT - Semester 2 Grade Check

• Students who participate in a fall sport are also subject to a grade check using the "Semester 2" grade. The WIAA requires schools to use the following grid to determine the period of ineligibility for a student who receives a failing grade at the end of the second semester: <u>https://www.wiaawi.org/Portals/0/PDF/Eligibility/academicineligibility.pdf</u>

ATTENDANCE REMINDER - Co-Curricular Code

• Students must be in attendance for all scheduled classes to be eligible to practice, perform, or participate in an activity. (Exception: a senior student may leave 3rd block if he/she qualifies for open campus). Students in Physical Education must participate in the class to be eligible for practice or games that day. Excused absences not including illness during the day, are at the discretion of the school administration. (ie: funerals, doctor or dental appointments, college visits) A student may miss up to two (2) blocks for an appointment. The doctor/dentist/college must verify the appointment. Any other exceptions are at the discretion of administration.

HONOURS INC. SCHOLARSHIP CEREMONY

Our local scholarship foundation held their annual awards ceremony on Wednesday, April 9th at 7:00pm in the Performing Arts Center. Fiftynine seniors received scholarships from this generous organization. The grand total awarded for both college & vocational scholarships was \$292,850.

COUNSELING NEWS

AP Exams - AP Exams will take place May 5 - May 16. Here is a link to the 2025 exam date and time <u>https://apstudents.collegeboard.org/exam-</u> <u>dates</u>

ACT - There will be two ACT test dates this summer. June 14 with a registration deadline of May 9, and July 12 with a registration deadline of June 6. Any Junior who would like to improve their ACT score for admissions or potential scholarships should consider one of these dates. Students can register by logging into their myact.org account.

Seniors - All colleges require students to submit a final high school transcript after graduation. It is the students' responsibility to submit a request through Parchment (<u>www.parchment.com</u>) to have it sent to the college that he/she plans to attend in the fall. If you have questions, contact your son/daughter's counselor.

Direct Admit Wisconsin - Slinger High School is a participating school in the college admission program called Direct Admit Wisconsin. All of the UW Colleges are part of the Direct Admit Wisconsin program, with the exception of UW Madison, UW Eau Claire, and UW La Crosse. Juniors that opt into this program will have their transcript reviewed by Direct Admit Wisconsin and will receive communication in July from each UW that is providing the student direct admission. No application is required. This is a voluntary program that students opt in to. The deadline to opt in is May 1st. See your child's counselor if you want to confirm your student's status. The class of 2027 will have an opportunity to opt into the program when registering for the upcoming school year in August through family access.

The Wisconsin Guarantee - Last year, Governor Evers signed into legislation The Wisconsin Guarantee that states students who are in the top 5% of their graduating class will be admitted to all UW colleges. The top 10% of students in their graduating class will be guaranteed admission to all UW Colleges with the exception of UW Madison.

If a student is interested in UW Madison, UW Eau Claire or UW LaCrosse an application for admission will be required. For students that opt into Direct Admit an application will not be required to all other UW colleges. However, if a student is not opted into Direct Admit an application will be required to the college. CAPP CLASS INFORMATION

In addition to the Advanced Placement class offerings, there are nine options for receiving dual college credits in the CAPP Program (College Writing, World Literature, Public Speaking, Sociology, Intro to Education, Spanish V, German V, Accounting III, and Chemistry). Students can earn 3 college credits for each course (College Writing, World Literature, Intro to Public Speaking, Intro to Education, Accounting III, and Sociology) or 5 credits <u>plus</u> 11 retroactive credits for Spanish V or German V, or 10 credits for Chemistry. The course fee is \$110 per credit or \$55 per credit if there is a financial need. Students will request a transcript after graduation to take to their universities or technical colleges. Juniors have already applied for next year in their current English class Sophomores applied with Mrs. Keliher. The deadline is July 31st.. **This is a free application without any commitments**. Registration for specific courses and course fees happen in the fall or spring. These college credits transfer to most colleges or universities (4-year and 2-year), including all of Wisconsin schools. There are multiple ways students can earn English credits for college. If they do well on the AP language exam, they can earn 3 or more credits towards Writing 101. In addition, students can take College Writing CAPP (3 cr.) and World Literature CAPP (3 cr) their senior year and earn six college elective credits. AP Literature can also earn students 3 elective credits as well.

INTERNSHIP/YOUTH APPRENTICESHIP NEWS

Applications for summer and the 2025-26 school year have been made available to students through an online application. <u>APPLICATION</u> Applications are due at the end of April. If your son or daughter is interested in gaining career related experience and he or she has not applied, please encourage them to see their counselor or Russ Hermann as soon as possible. Interviews will take place the first two weeks of May. It is important for the applications to be turned in ASAP.

There are many local businesses in many different career fields that will consider taking a student learner. Currently there are over 100 students in the program. ATTENTION CLASS OF 2026: SENIOR PICTURE INFORMATION

In order for the Slinger High School yearbook staff to print the color senior picture in the yearbook, seniors must meet the requirements listed below.

* Senior portraits should be taken no later than September 1 in order for professional photographers to complete and submit to the yearbook on time.

* The deadline for any photographer to turn them in is **OCTOBER 20**.

* The photographer of choice must provide one **color** glossy <u>head-and-shoulders digital photo, vertical layout</u> and the student must be looking at the camera.

* Digital images must have a resolution of at least 300dpi. This jpg image should be emailed to <u>sara.hansen@slingerschools.org</u>. Please save the image with the student's last name and first name (i.e. Smith, Joe).

* Clothing in the portrait must be **appropriate:**

* No uniforms or unusual attire.

* No pets, vehicles, or props.

* No hats.

* <u>Must follow school dress code</u> (no bare shoulders, spaghetti straps, too revealing cleavage, etc.). This is to ensure a classy, respected yearbook. Students may take other shots for their own use, but the yearbook photo should be classy and not provocative.

* A "soft-focus" picture may appear slightly blurry in the yearbook. This is not recommended.

* If a senior does not submit a photo on or before OCTOBER 20th, the yearbook staff will use his/her school photo ID picture.

2nd SEMESTER EXAM SCHEDULE 2025-26 SCHOOL YEAR

SEMESTER EXAMS GUIDELINES & COMMENTS

1. Semester exams will be given over a four-day period, beginning Friday, June 6th. See the exam schedule for scheduled times.

2. <u>Students are to be at their exams on time</u>. Students who are tardy for an exam will not be allowed into the classroom. <u>Tardy & unexcused students may lose the opportunity to take the final exam</u>. Students who are legitimately excused from an exam(s) may make up the exam(s) on Wednesday, June 11th at a 7:25 start time in the IMC. <u>Entry after the start times is not</u> allowed.

3. All students must take all exams during the assigned time on the exam schedule.

4. <u>Students MAY NOT switch testing periods without written permission from an administrator.</u> Switches will only be permitted under extenuating circumstances that are confirmed by parents. All exams must be completed by 10:30am on Wednesday, June 11th.

5. Students are not required to report to school at times they do not have exams. All students in the building but not taking an exam are to be in their <u>assigned</u> study hall. Students must remain out of other school district buildings and off middle school property.

6. <u>Students are not to be in the halls or at their lockers during exam periods</u>. Students may go to lockers during the break periods. Students arriving early for an exam must go to the cafeteria until the next break.

7. Teachers are not to dismiss students early.

8. There will be only one lunch each day. Students may leave school during lunch. Students should not loiter in the parking lot. Students are held solely responsible for returning on time for their next exam.

9. The resource period is an open study time. Students must be in the cafeteria or library. Students, with a pass may also seek teacher assistance. Hallways should remain clear.
